Lord Mayor hails crime festival as a huge success

The Lord Mayor of Norwich, Marion Maxwell, described her visit to *Noir*wich Crime Writing Festival as 'most wonderful' and hailed it as a huge success for 2016.

The third annual festival for lovers of crime fiction took place between 15 – 18 September, attracting around 1,000 audience members to events across the city.

Highlights included international bestselling authors Peter James and Ian Rankin, a free family crime trail in the city centre and a very Bloody Brunch in the medieval grounds of Dragon Hall.

The Lord Mayor attended a panel on 'Domestic Noir' at Writers' Centre Norwich, Dragon Hall on the Saturday, and met celebrated authors of the genre Julia Crouch, Christobel Kent and Sarah Hilary afterwards.

She said: 'I had the most wonderful time and it was amazing to meet the writers. The panel I attended was inviting and the authors just divine. They all had a great sense of humour and were so easy to talk with.'
