

## **Style Guidance for Prospective Contributors**

Paragraphs should be indented. Quotations longer than three lines of prose or two lines of verse should be indented on both sides and separated from the main body of the text. This is not an academic journal: if you wish to include publication information on titles, please do so inside parentheses, and if you have any notes for further reading or related websites, simply place these at the end of the essay. Titles of books should be in italics, as well as words singled out for emphasis, single foreign words not naturalised in English and foreign phrases. No other form of emphasis (capitals, bold, large print, etc.) should be used and careful use of inverted commas is recommended. Changes, or additions within quotations, as well as elisions, are marked by square brackets. Spelling should follow British conventions. Quotations in languages other than English should be followed by an English translation, whose author should be acknowledged in a footnote. We follow The Economist Style Guide. And, if quoting from or referencing a translated text, please remember to name the translator!
